Disc or Rim Brakes?

This past Winter in our FB group we had a lively discussion about disc versus rim brakes. Each brake type certainly has its own pros and cons, but for an old school guy like myself, you'd really have to convince me well to abandon a trusted rim brake as the brake of choice. As I heard comments akin to "Hey Boomer", I ran across this article from Bike Snob NYC:

This is a great discussion about the nostalgia and practicality of rim brakes, followed by a good discussion of the current state of the industry.

Then earlier this year, I learned that Tadej Pogacar reluctantly switched from rim brakes to disc for 2024. Why did her prefer rim brakes anyway?

The most likely reason was weight. Better climbing for the Tour de France. But equipment changes in 2024 forced his hand to go disc on all his bikes.

Now, it seems that the pro peloton is really stretching the limits of materials by shaving weight off the wheels to make disc brake wheels as light as rim brakes. Stories of wheels disintegrating are out there from too few spokes and too much pressure on the hubs from the superior disc brake forces.

Let the buyer beware!

Build Your Dream Bike

Part IV

Back to building our vintage fixed gear bike. As you recall, I chose a red 1983 Colnago Super racing frame. As was true of almost all racing frames of that era, it's made from Cro-Moly double butted steel tubes. Colnago traditionally joined the tubes with precision machined lugs to gain the proper strength at the joints. When I raced in the '80's, Colnagos were joined in the peloton by bicycles made by De Rosa, Guerciotti, Ciocc, and Bianchi. They were all good frames and any vintage frames made by these manufacturers are still collector's items today. Back then, fellow club member Jim Townsend and Breakaway Bicycles rider Andy Synder both rode Colnago.



But really, the best reason I wanted a vintage Colnago frame for the new build was that I raced on a black 1982 Colnago Super from 1982 through 1989. It survived several crashes without ever breaking or being bent out of shape. In particular, the bike survived a 35 mph sprint at Grattan where I planted my front wheel right into my teammate's (Don Eeingenberg) back, somersaulting me over the bars. I had abrasions on every corner of my body, but the bike came out with only scratches. Amazingly strong. Me? I stuck to the bed sheets for the next 3 weeks from oozing wounds.



But I did not ride just in the standard friction shifting derailleur setup. The RW Race Team had roller races and a Spring fixed gear training series followed by the Fisk Knob road race (later—a time trial). With the right tools, you can remove a freewheel from the rear hub to reveal just a threaded area. Guess what? It's exactly the right size and threading to screw on loose track cogs. Back then I had several tracks cogs I could spin on for road or for rollers. After acquiring a track chain, I was in business.

I also tore that old black Colnago apart to a bare frame quite a few times for maintenance. So I was pretty sure I could build something up, if I could just find a good bare frame.

We HIGHLY RECOMMEND you use a rear light. A blinking RED light is best, radar even better. Next year we will REQUIRE the use of such a red light.


